4 5 AN**ACT** TO **APPROPRIATE FUNDS** FOR RESTORATION AND RECONSTRUCTION HISTORIC ST. **PHILIPS** OF CHURCH AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA HERITAGE EDUCATION CENTER AT OLD SALEM.

Whereas, the State of North Carolina has a rich and diverse religious and cultural heritage which is exemplified by Old Salem; and

Whereas, the Moravians who founded Salem in 1766 carried with them a religious heritage as ancient as any in the Protestant tradition, as well as a knowledge of agriculture, architecture, skilled crafts, and industry; and

Whereas, plans have been made to construct the North Carolina Heritage Education Center to be used to orient and educate the more than 55,000 North Carolina school students and 400,000 other visitors from North Carolina and other states who visit Old Salem each year; and

Whereas, the trustees of Old Salem, Incorporated, have committed to a \$25 million campaign to provide for these and other restorations and improvements at Old Salem; and Whereas, the further development of Old Salem as a vehicle through which to interpret North Carolina's religious and cultural heritage to its people will help instill in its people the values which have been the source of its success and will have the additional benefit of drawing additional travel and tourist revenues and jobs to our State; Now, therefore,

Section 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to Old Salem, Incorporated, a nonprofit corporation, the sum of eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) for the 2000-2001 fiscal year for the restoration and development of the St. Philips Church and the construction of the North Carolina Heritage Education Center at Old Salem.

Section 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2000.
